### **Media of the Month**



Most teenagers deal with personal issues that come standard with the age -- self-identity, thinking about what to do later in life, relationships with friends -- issues that they will eventually overcome. For Elizabeth, 18, who has a rare disease called Cloacal Anomaly, being a teenager means not only dealing with the issues most teenagers face, but also dealing with a disease that has affected her as a young person and will continue to affect her for the rest of her life.

#### 3 Reasons why this is worth watching:

- 1. Use of home movies gives us an intimacy with Elizabeth. We feel we've known her a long time and have grown up with her.
- 2. "Dear Diary" voice-over helps make it intimate and empathetic. This is a rare disability and the filmmaker gets us on Lizzy's side right away. Later we even get to see her diary where she says, "I wish I were normal."



3. I like the filmmakers ability to capture Lizzy's honesty. As a teenager she talks about depression, her fears and her struggle for independence. She also talks about using humor as a protective device.

In addition, the filmmaker uses great restraint with music, just enough to help the story along, not to distract.
